By 2028, U.S. consumption is projected to range between 325 and 580 TWh, depending on technological and operational scenarios. Global energy use follows a similar upward trend, reaching approximately 850 TWh by 2028. The chart highlights the accelerating demand for data center energy driven by AI and emerging technologies.

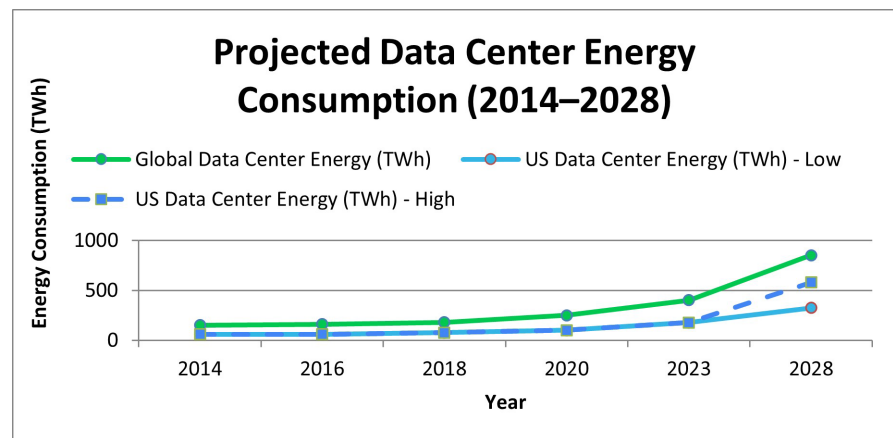


Figure 1. Global data center energy consumption trends (2014–2028). Data sources: International Energy Agency (IEA) 2024 report; Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory 2024 US Data Center Energy Usage Report.

The average PUE, which reflects the ratio of total facility energy to IT equipment energy, declined steadily from approximately 2.5 in 2007 to around 1.4 in 2023, indicating enhanced energy efficiency. Hyperscale data centers—those operated by major cloud providers—achieved even lower PUEs, improving from about 2.0 in 2007 to 1.1 by 2023. This trend highlights the industry’s continued focus on optimizing infrastructure efficiency, especially through advanced cooling and power management technologies.

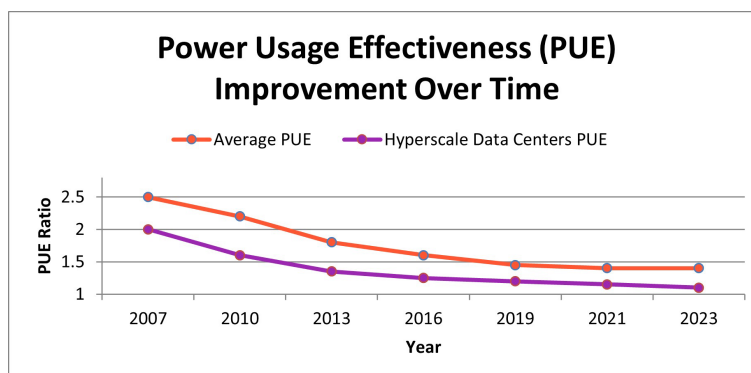


Figure 2. Power Usage Effectiveness (PUE) improvement in data centers (2007-2023). Data source: 2024 US Data Center Energy Usage Report.

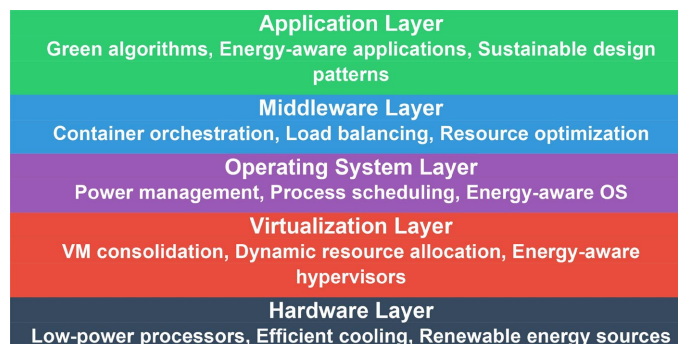


Figure 3. Green software engineering technology stack.
